- (1) Total number of victims and witnesses, identified as a child, associated with cases that have witness related hearings (trial, newton hearing, special reasons hearing or an appeal against conviction) in all courts.
- (2) A child, in the Compass Witness Management System, is defined as a victim or witness aged under 18.
- (a) Required attendance is defined as the number of required attendances at court. If a witness is required to attend more than Witness Management System (WMS) will count each time they are required to attend.
- (b) A witness may be called or summonsed to attend a court hearing but may not necessarily give evidence; the hearing may be or the defendant may enter a late guilty plea.
- The CPS records some limited data, identifying the number of victims and witnesses, whether they are required to attend hearing and attendance at the same, recorded in the Witness Management System (WMS).
- The WMS is a purpose built electronic system designed to enable Witness Care Unit (WCU) staff to manage their cases includes enabling them to identify cases involving children and other vulnerable or intimidated victims and witnesses so that the them with appropriate support and information.
- Victim and witness data are only recorded if a case is handled by a WCU which uses WMS. Not all cases are managed and a number of CPS Areas do not use WMS. It follows that there are many cases for which victim and witness information is
